The ongoing democratization processes in Sub-Saharan Africa are taking place in a context characterized by high levels of poverty and inequality, the weakness of governance institutions, and strong external pressures which are resulting in ever-increasing policy conditionalities.

In Southern Africa these issues are closely linked to the efforts of the post-colonial states aimed at regulating and defining land access and the institutions of local governance in the rural areas. The consequence of this process has been the re-statement of the idea of a bifurcated state, based on dual forms of citizenship – national and local-ethnic, that has contributed to the crisis of State institutions. The answer to this crisis has to take into consideration both processes of institution building and issues of local development and access to and control of key resources, such as land.

The extensive debate about the land question affects most of the Southern Africa countries and in particular Zimbabwe. The latter is an emblematic case of the complex relations between democracy and access to resources in Southern Africa.
